How to use this resource

This guide will help those caring for places of worship find funding to look after and improve their buildings.

You might be looking for funding to repair your building, make it warmer and more energy efficient, improve access for disabled people or create or add space for your local community.

This guide has three main parts.

1. Contents Page

The contents page lists every fund in this guide.

Next to each fund is either the name of a denomination or a coloured symbol. These correspond to the colours referred to in the flow diagram.

2. Funding Flow Diagram

Start with the flow diagram. It asks simple questions about your project and helps you decide which funding opportunities are most suitable. Once the flow diagram points you to a colour, use the contents page to find the right fund. You can then turn to the page in the funding index to read more about it.

3. Funding Index

The funding index lists a range of organisations that offer grants. This list is not exhaustive and does not include all local or regional funders, many of which only support projects in a small area.

The grants are divided into:

- **National funders**, which support projects across the country.
- **Local funders**, which only support projects in certain areas.

The grants are also grouped by the amount of money they offer, so you can quickly find funding that matches your project.

At the end of the document you will find a section on loans. These lenders specialise in supporting charitable or faith based projects.

Before you apply

Before you apply for a grant, you will need to have a plan for your project.

This may include:

- getting advice and a building condition survey from architects, surveyors or other building experts
- deciding what work needs to be done
- writing a project plan
- working out the costs
- speaking to your denominational lead, if this applies to you
- Getting the necessary permissions for the work either through your denomination or the local authority as applicable
- talking to your congregation and local community

If you need money to help with planning before you apply for larger grants, some funders can support this stage. The flow diagram will show you which ones.

Historically, some trusts were founded to support specific religious traditions or denominations. This is why the flow diagram asks questions about specific places of worship and why some funds in the index are marked with a specific denomination.

Every funder is different. Each one has its own rules about who can apply and what it will fund. After using the flow diagram and funding index, visit the funder's website to check that your project is eligible. This will also tell you how to apply.

Most of the funders in this guide only give grants to registered charities. They also usually expect you to apply before any work has started.

Some trusts will only get in touch if your application is successful, and many are not able to give feedback if it isn't. While we hope this guide helps you find the right funding opportunities, we can't guarantee that every application will be successful.

Which funder is the right match for my place of worship?

This diagram will help you find organisations that may be able to support your project. Use the flow diagram together with the Funding Index.

Historically, trusts were founded to support the buildings of specific religions and denominations. This is why the flow diagram encourages you to find funders that are a good fit for your specific place of worship by asking questions about denomination and location before considering broader, national funds. This tool is a starting point. There are many other funders that may be appropriate for you that are not listed in the Funding Index.

Every organisation has its own rules about who can apply and what it will support. Once you have found some possible funders, use the Funding Index to learn more about them. Then visit each organisation's website to check that your project meets its requirements before you apply.

Most of the organisations in this guide only give grants to registered charities. They also usually expect you to apply before any work has started.

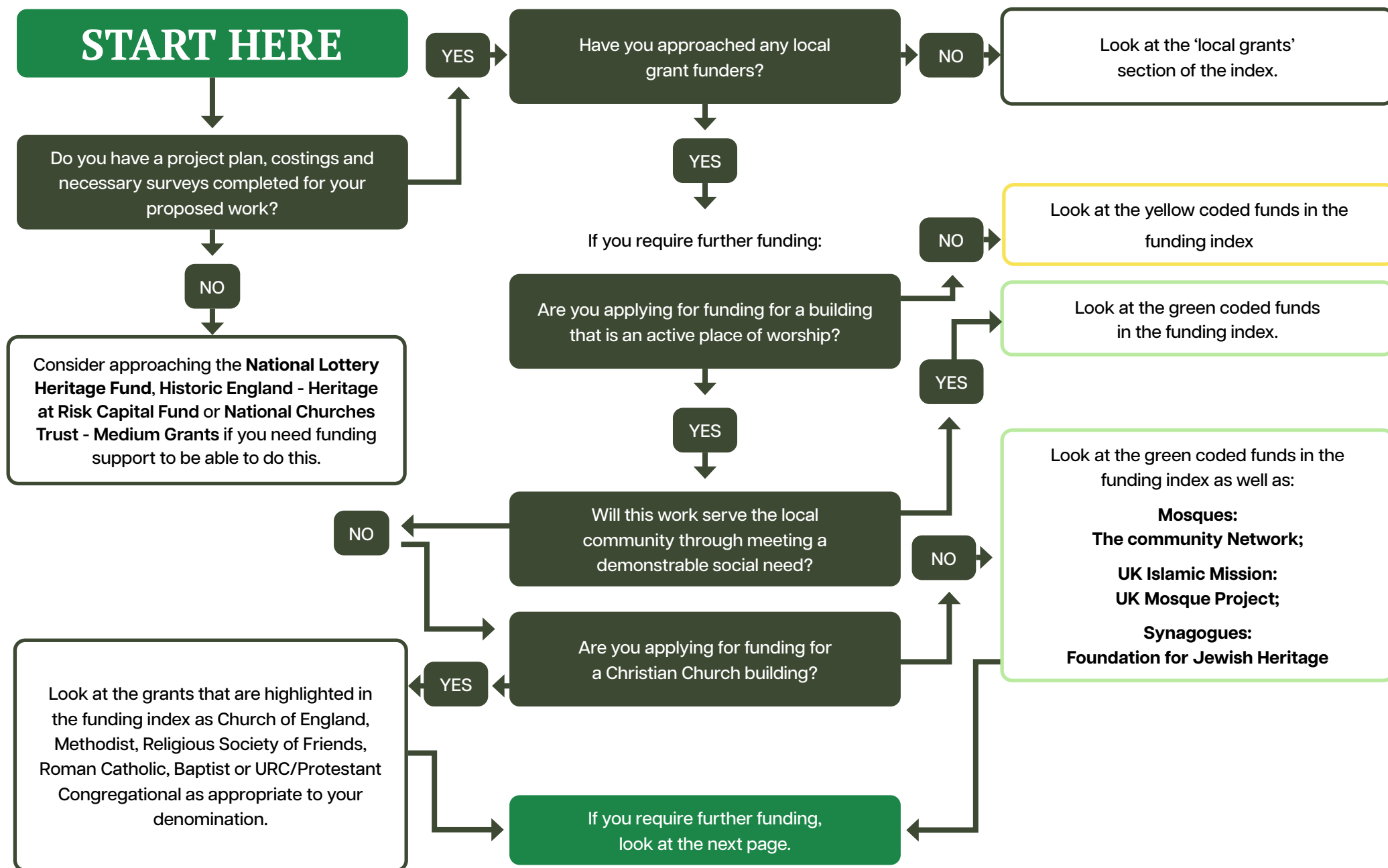
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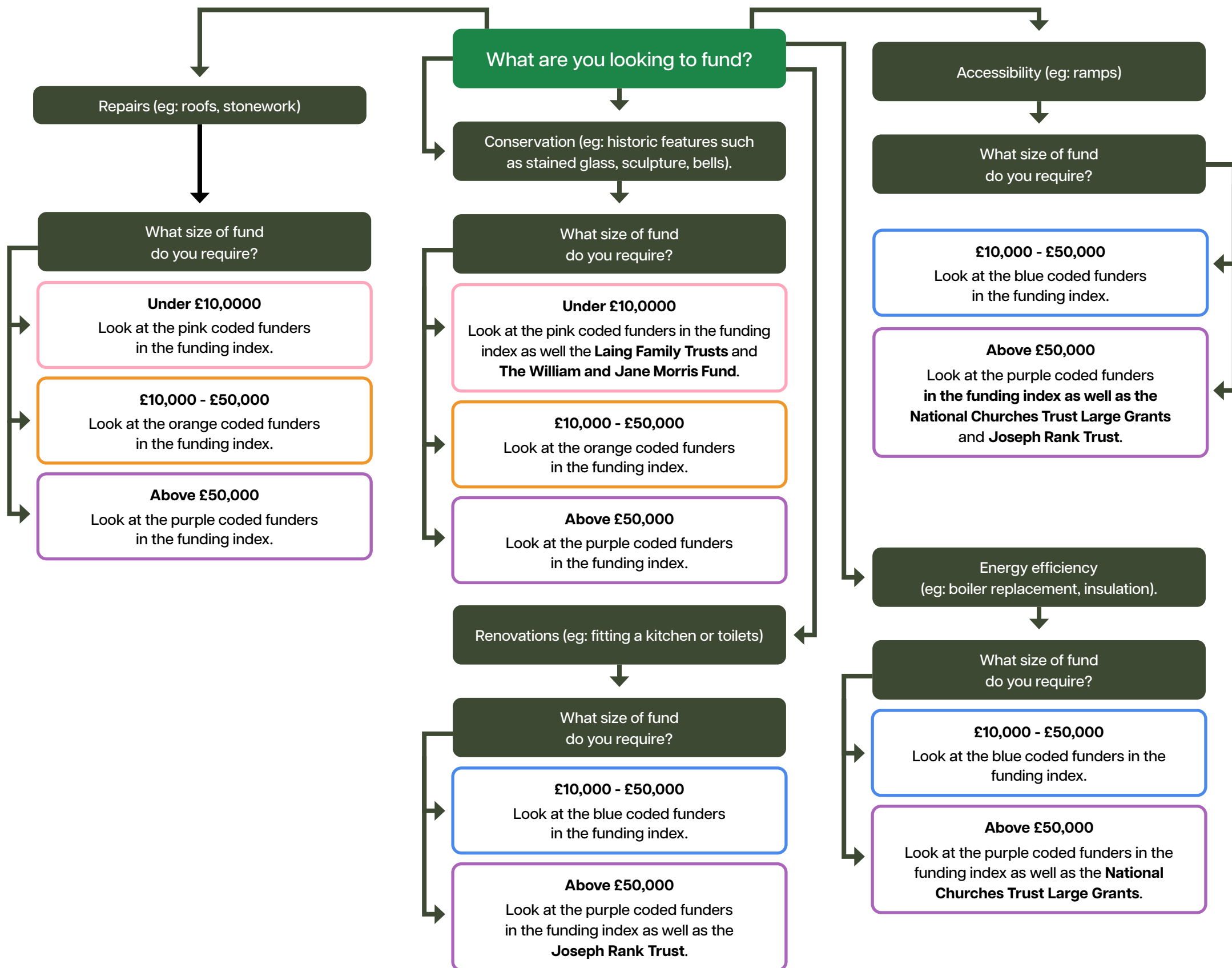
Before you apply for funding

Taking time to plan your project will improve your chances of securing funding.

- Be clear about your project. Write a short summary explaining the need, what you want to achieve and how you plan to do it.
- Get a professional assessment. If your project involves building work, arrange a professional survey or inspection. This will help you estimate costs and provide evidence that the work is needed.
- Prepare a budget. Work out the total cost of your project. You will need to apply to more than one funder, so consider approaching larger funders (eg: National Lottery Heritage Fund, Benefact Trust) first for major projects.
- Seek advice. If you are part of a denomination, speak to your denomination's buildings adviser or, if you are part of the Church of England, your Diocesan Church Buildings Team.
- Learn from others. Talk to organisations that have completed similar projects to gain practical advice and useful contacts.
- Develop your project plan. Include the project costs and explain why it is important for your congregation, community and the building's heritage.
- Consult and get permissions. Ask your community for feedback and obtain any approvals or consents you need before applying for funding such as from your denomination or a Listed Buildings Consent.
- Speak to funders. Many funders are happy to discuss your project before you apply. If you are unsure whether your project is eligible, contact the funder for advice before submitting your application.

- Parks and gardens registered at Grade II, and Grade II buildings and historic assets which are of high community value outside a Conservation Area will be considered where the project delivers considerable public benefit
- Private dwellings, places of worship and commercial buildings are only exceptionally considered
- Eligible historic sites owned by public bodies such as Local Authorities, universities, NHS institutions, free schools, academies, are eligible provided they are not part of their operational estate
- The National Heritage List for England is the official record of all listed buildings, scheduled monuments and registered parks and gardens.

Your project must involve the type of repair, conservation and conversion activities we will consider, which are:

- Capital works, including repair and preservation. Costs covered may include professional fees, non-recoverable VAT, and insurance

This may include research, investigations, testing, and monitoring (such as energy audits), as well as condition surveys, management plans, reuse studies, feasibility assessments, material procurement, case studies, and accessibility audits. - Applications should be accompanied by quotations wherever possible. The Trust recommends that churches consider obtaining 2 or 3 quotations for medium-large building works (say, over £5,000).
